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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

A cradle of inclusivity, diversity and love for learning, Lalgola College stands as a pioneering institution in Murshidabad. With an aim to instill, in students, the idea of sustaining a purposeful engagement with the world, the college strives to develop an expansive space where the individual becomes the universal and vice versa.

Considering the acute need of education particularly among the minority community and backward classes some philanthropists became keen in establishing a college for proliferation of education among the people of this area.

Situated in a remote corner of West Bengal, the college has been committed to nurturing young minds. Since its inception in 2005, the college has been venturing to remove socio-economic barriers and discrimination faced by them. Lalgola College is the only general degree college under entire Lalgola and Bhagawangola block. The first academic session of the college started with only 65 students and at present it boasts of more than 2000 enrolled students. The main motto of Lalgola College is based on providing justice, equality and liberty to young students. Teachers always try to enable students to be intellectually mature, morally upright, socially responsible citizens and spiritually inspired leaders to serve the society and the nation. Lalgola College envisions a world where students have their rightful place and are given due recognition as leaders who reach top positions in all sectors of human endeavors.

The framework of National Educational Policy 2020 strengthens the ethos of multidisciplinarity, sustainable development, social entrepreneurship, skill development and employability. Keeping these very principles in mind, Lalgola College remains committed to achieving academic brilliance and nurturing change makers.

- The Institution is endowed with a passionate team of teachers with good academic backgrounds, expertise and experience in their respective domain of knowledge, dedicated and efficient nonteaching staff who help the institute to march forward under the guidance of the competent authority of the college.
- The contribution of faculty members in academic sphere is appreciable. The college focuses on academic research. Faculty members and students are encouraged by IQAC to take up various research projects and participate in seminars. IQAC also keenly looks after the publication of Books and journals with ISSN and ISBN.
- The college maintains academic discipline.
- Students and teachers share a healthy and enriching relationship.
- Utmost importance is given on environment and value based education.
- The college believes in decentralization of power. Work is distributed among various committees for accomplishing the goals efficiently.
- The College practices transparency in its financial, academic, administrative, and auxiliary functions. Thus, these are carried out in a very clean and fair manner. Admission is an online process which is strictly on the basis of merit in accordance with the government reservation policies. Recruitments of teaching and non teaching staff are also done as per government norms.
- The cost of education is kept very low for the students.
- The enrolment percentage of students has stood above 78.75% on an average over the last five years nearly 83.69% of the students have successfully passed their final examination.
- Students' performance in various competitive examinations and sports are commendable.
- Sincere contribution of the college in conserving the history and heritage of the region is praiseworthy.
- The college proudly claims of having more than 70% enrolled female students.
- The women squad of the college is actively engaged in women empowerment.

Institutional Weakness

- The College is struggling to meet the needs of the vast academic system (e.g. CBCS system and NEP 2020) with its insufficient infrastructure (especially lack of sufficient class rooms, computer labs, space constraint, etc which are required for smooth functioning of CBCS and NEP systems). Furthermore, the paucity of teaching and especially non-teaching staff is one of the major weaknesses of the college.
- Partial digitization of library has created problems in accessing information regarding teaching, learning and research activities.
- Lack of frequent Seminars and workshops is another weakness of the college.
- The potential for academy-industry linkage should be exploited more.
- Lack of infrastructural facility for incubation centre is another major weakness of the college.
- Inadequate renewable energy sources is another cause of concern.

Institutional Opportunity

- Construction of new buildings will prove conducive to run the CBCS and NEP system efficiently.
- Commencement of vocational courses and introduction of streams like science and commerce will increase the enrollment of students.
- The upgradation of College library can facilitate the students and staff of the college to access various text books, reference books, journals and many other learning resources and will thus propagate research activities and enhance employability of the students.
- Better internet facilities will create better connectivity and will increase the academic output of the College to a great extent.
- Centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola has the potential to preserve the history of Lalgola and transmit it within new generation and bring this once rich region into prominence.
- NSS unit, women's cell and career counseling can contribute significantly in making Lalgola ecofriendly, gender neutral and an overall progressive region of the country.
- The college can play an important role in the upliftment of socio economic status the region.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Lalgola College is a constituent college of the University of Kalyani and follows the Syllabus prescribed by the university. The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) was introduced from 2018-2019 academic session and NEP 2020 was implemented from 2023-2024 academic session.

The academic activities are-well-planned, ahead of each academic session and the entire process is streamlined with central and departmental academic calendars, time tables, with work load and administrative task distributed among the faculties.

Before the commencement of every semester respective departments prepare a study plan assignment for the individual teachers and number of classes allotted to each course. On the basis of these routine sub committees prepare a detailed time table for entire semester. Finally, this is distributed to the departmental teachers through the notice board.

Each Department meets the students in every semester in a session where they discuss academic calendar and teaching plan and receive feedbacks from the students.

The teachers of the College always respond to any call for workshops on changes and reforms in the syllabus as members of Board of Studies of the University. Several teachers provide suggestions according to their areas of expertise and make use of students' feedback to suggest improvement in teaching methodology.

Experiential learning through projects field work, study tours etc. facilitate as a part of curriculum implementation. The college and the departments organize seminars workshops and special lectures to integrate several cross-cutting issues prescribed in the curriculum like gender, ethics, human values, environment and sustainability externally relevant to students in today's world. Extension activities organized by the college N.S.S unit also address the said.

Many of our teachers take great initiative towards making power point presentation in order to make their teaching more effective. Lalgola College has one smart class room with modern teaching aids and equipment, which are made use of greatly.

In addition to these, Lalgola College conducts departmental seminars where the students and teachers take part. Students take part in seminars and present their papers on specific subjects. We also invite experts on different subjects and they address the students in various seminars in order to enrich the students and teachers alike.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

In a student -centric approach to learning, classrooms move from direct instruction to a more community-driven environment, one which supports student empowerment, conversations, critical thinking skills, independence and problem-solving techniques. Student centric learning strategies do require and involve students in the overall planning, process, implementation and assessments.

assignments, surprise tests, and class participation, etc.

Most of the faculty members generally adopt a student centric approach such as project based and problemsolving method as well as participative learning approaches.

In such strategies emphasis is given on student collaboration, communication and creativity as well as teacher as facilitator.

Departments such as education, Geography and environmental studies provide shorter projects with a problem for students. This strategy utilizes relevant, real-life connections to the outside world providing students valuable experience with problem solving and critical thinking opportunities.

Most of our departments, adopt innovative teaching strategies, such as peer tutoring, meetings among teachers, students & parents.

Such strategies enable the students to feel involved in the participatory process.

Students are taken to natural history museums and other historical places. Mock parliaments are held. Students are encouraged to participate in inter-college sports. The learning experience is enriched by extensive use of ICT tools- PPTS Projects, excursions, conferences add to the learning experience.

A system of continuous evaluation also helps the teachers assess the progress of the students. This process of evaluation consists of written examinations, open book test, group presentations, seminars, quiz, debates, projects, practical examinations with viva voce etc.

Research, Innovations and Extension

A Research and Publication Committee had been constituted in Lalgola College in 2019. This committee organizes seminars and webinars with the initiative of various departments in the college. Twenty eight research papers of the professors have been published in various journals and books during the academic year 2019-20 to 2023-2024. Three full time teachers of the college obtained Ph. D degree during 2019 to 2022 and one teacher obtained M. Phil degree. Currently one teacher is pursuing Ph. D. In addition, two SACT (State Aided College Teacher) teachers of the college during this period obtained Ph. D degree and one SACT is currently pursuing Ph. D degree.

Besides, laptops have been provided to the professors of various departments for the development of research

work.

The college has its own library with about 10000 books.

Several journals on different subjects are purchased monthly or yearly.

One seminar hall equipped with projector system and three smart class rooms will be functioning shortly

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Lalgola College is relentlessly trying to upgrade its infrastructural facilities since its inception. The college is affiliated to Kalyani University and many courses have been introduced with the combinations provided by the university from time to time.

To increase student strength, the college has always taken proactive steps to provide various facilities to develop the infrastructure of the campus in terms of classrooms, laboratories and for sports and extra cocurricular activities.

The main building of the college accommodates the class rooms, Library, Principal's room, teachers' room, office room; cash counter, separate common rooms for boys and girls. and a gymnasium. Common rooms for students have adequate recreational facilities. There are sanitary napkin vending machines and disposable machine in the girls' common room.

Besides the main building, there is a separate building for the students' union and college canteen. There are eleven well ventilated, specious and fully furnished class rooms for conducting theory classes. Out of these eleven class rooms, one room has a smart board and two class rooms have LCD projectors and internet facilities. Other than these, there are laboratories for Geography Department and Physical Education Department. The laboratories are upgraded with advanced equipment and have enough space to carry out practical classes effectively. There is a computer lab in the college as well. There are twenty-three computers in the college. Seven computers are used to carry out office related works. All the computers are connected with internet facilities. Free Wi-Fi connection is available in the campus. Students are encouraged to avail Wi-Fi facilities for academic purposes.

There is a seminar hall with a capacity of accommodating two hundred people and the hall is well equipped with good audio-visual facilities. The college Library has approximately ten thousand books and twenty four journals for students and staff as well.

Students' common rooms have recreational facilities like indoor games. Students' representatives take keen interest in the maintenance of common rooms. Students and staff are also encouraged to use college gymnasium

for maintaining good physical health. There is a separate room for College NSS unit.

The college also boasts of a large cycle garage to promote green and sustainable transportation practices. Fire extinguishers are installed in the college building as a part of disaster management. There is an open-air stage for cultural programs and proper arrangement of purified drinking water is available in the college campus. The sprawling lawn of the college has resting benches for students.

Student Support and Progression

1. The college website and notice board provide all information about various activities of the college to students. To keep the admission process hassle free students are admitted through online admission portal strictly on the basis of merit. Details regarding eligibility criteria, reservation of seats, intake capacity, fees structure, rules and regulations related to admission are regularly updated and clearly notified. The class routine is also made available in the college website and notice board. Students from the minority groups, SCs, STs and OBCs are continuously notified about the various scholarships provided by the Government.

2. Besides imparting conventional education, the college also focuses on other multifarious activities of social sphere. The college, in collaboration with other colleges and institutions, try to enhance the social and employability skills of the students. Educational excursions are conducted by various departments to give the students exposure of our culture and heritage.

3. Special care is taken to address issues like low attendance, dropout and stagnation through tutorials, individual interaction and bilingual explanations. The college also encourages the students for participation in extra-curricular activities.

4. The college has a very strong Sports Wing and NSS unit who prepare policies and strategies for organizing different programs related to such activities. It also has a gymnasium for the physical fitness of the students and teachers as well. The college also takes care of the mental well-being of the students and seminar and workshops related to mental health issues are organized from time to time.

5. The college shows zero tolerance for ragging and has thus implemented the UGC regulations fully.

6. The Career counseling cell keeps students updated regarding various job opportunities and guide students in their career related matters.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- 1. The vision and mission of the institute has been framed by giving due consideration to the suggestions and views of stake holders.
- 2. The Vision and Mission of the institute are in tune with the objectives of higher education. Institute has a mechanism for delegating authority and providing operational autonomy to all the functionaries to work towards decentralized governance system and participative management. Principal, as the head of the institution of the College, purely believes in collective participative management and decentralized governance.
- 3. The institute is having a well structured Governing Body (GB). The three crucial sections i.e. office administration, academics, and the auxiliary bodies for extra-curricular activities play important role in the overall functioning of the institute. The Governing Body meets periodically to monitor progress and suggest strategies. The Principal, the members of academic sub-committee, and the secretary of teachers' council meet regularly to take decisions on academic matters.
- 4. The Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) keeps a regular tab on the academic aspects and activities of the College. It devises and formulates plans relating to future academic growth and sustenance of quality. IQAC collects feedback from final year students. Students, Teachers and Alumni effectively contribute to the successful functioning of IQAC. Internal Academic Audit is conducted every year. College website is regularly updated to provide exhaustive information regarding the overall functioning of the college.
- 5. The Teachers' Council is an important forum where issues related to academic matters and overall development of the College in general are taken up. The management seeks the confidence of the Teachers' Council in implementing certain key targets.
- 6. The management of the college encourages and welcomes suggestions from all the stake folders of the college.

The whole process of fund allocation and management is supervised by the Principal. The Governing Body also recommends proposals for the effective utilization of financial resources. Auditing is done annually and stipulations are met. Steady growth of infrastructure is incorporated in the strategic plan of the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Lalgola College promotes awareness on various environmental and socio cultural issues and works for the conservation of Mother Nature and rich historical heritage of Lalgola. Following Best practices are earnestly followed by Lalgola College:

1. Lalgola College Women Squad:

Objective: To provide local women with an education that will shape their outlook to re-define themselves and their roles in society.

Empowerment means working from a portion of enforced powerlessness to one of power. The Women Squad of Lalgola college visits women of the neighbouring village and spreads awareness among them on self-employment opportunities. Women's empowerment is impossible without education and economic independence. Since, the rate of literacy in the locality is low, women are taught to develop basic technological skills. They are made aware of the ideas of empowerment and skill-enhancement. Students of the college arrange for meetings with local women and discuss with them the commercial aspects of the processes of pickle/jam making. They equip them with the knowledge of scientifically preserving these consumable items. Women are also taught the process of developing and branding their products. They are coached in the idea of 'Atmanirbhar Bharat', promoted by the Ministry of Micro, small and Medium Enterprises.

The Women Squad also help local women in understanding the adverse effects of child and women trafficking and child-marriage.

2. Centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola

Objective: To preserve the history of Lalgola and transmit it within new generation.

Lalgola stands as a region of historical, cultural and social significance. It had been home to zamindars and settlers who migrated from various regions of India, especially Western India, during the 18th and 19th centuries. In recent years, Lalgola, an important site of historical and cultural significance is slipping into oblivion.

The Centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola endeavours to, redeem the History of Lalgola, and Maharaja Yogendra Narain Rai, the dared to combat the mighty British government. It tries to bring to the forefront the heritage sites of the place, with special focus on the Rajbari and the Kali temple. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

We are a Multidisciplinary College. We organise interdisciplinary talks and programmes. Many departments host webinars, seminars, events and study trips together(more than two departments). We

	inculcate the competence building habits among our students. Faculties engage students of other departments. We promote a holistic growth in the students.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Provisions of Academic bank of Credit proposed in NEP-2020 is to facilitate multiple entries and exit points for a student in their academic programs. This is an innovative idea to earn, deposit and transfer of credit through National schemes like SWAYAM, NPTEL, V-Lab. A portal (www.abc.gov.in) has been launched by Ministry of Education, Govt. of India where students can register themselves to earn and deposit credit. We welcome the change in the approaches of policy makers, which should help creating a common framework for the nation to take advantage of its demographic dividend. Our institution shall abide by the decision of the University of Kalyani (Affiliating University) and the Higher Education Department, West Bengal regarding the guidelines framed by them.
3. Skill development:	The CBCS system provides for SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSES for every subject taught at the College both in the Honours and General Levels. These courses help in equipping students with requisite skills beyond the theoretical knowledge systems. IQAC had taken some initiatives to organize few skill development programme like Tailoring, Computer Training, Spoken English courses for our students. Few students of our college were interested to join this courses. They were enlisted in these courses. But for some infrastructural problems we have not been able to start these courses till now.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	As most of our students are from Bengali Medium Schools , most of the lectures are delivered in the Vernacular (Bengali) with English as a supporting Language. We teach Bengali , Indian Philosophy as well as many English Translations of texts originally written in Indian Languages (In the Eng Lit syllabus). Celebrations of customs and traditions that reflect the vibrant Indian Culture as well as the commemoration of the Birth Anniversaries of poets and thinkers are organized. These occasions become opportunities for students to be aware of the beautiful and vibrant Indian Culture and tradition.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	As our college is a general degree college, our primary aim is to make students future ready. Students have plathora of career options like career in academics, administration, journalism, entrepreneurship and many more.Many of our students are working as teachers in different institutions. Some of the students are also working in administration. We encourage our students to proceed to higher education as well. Around 40% of our students progress to higher education in different universities every year. Some of them have qualified NET/ SET exams. A significant numbner of those students have enrolled into research based works and are pursuing their respective hounorary degrees. Some of them have successfully appeared in different competitive exams and are now posted in due Government jobs. Some of our students have joined local administrative posts and are actively working in decision making processes.
6. Distance education/online education:	The CBCS demands dissemination of knowledge within a time bound semesterized system to complete the syllabus as per lectures assigned for various modules in a lesson plan, UGC has recommended blended mode of teaching for educational institutes. Accordingly offline and online classes are conducted as per academic calendar of the institution. Post pandemic, College switched to offline mode in terms of teaching learning processes. The evaluation process continued in the blended mode for the first half of this academic session. In January 2023 the examinations were conducted in offline mode for the first time since Covid-19. The lessons learned during the challenging period of lockdown, when maintaining adequate communication with the students required a great deal of technical efficiency, became a resource for the improvement of communication with the students in these subsequent times. The practice of sharing learning materials through various digital platforms was maintained and enhanced as the students have benefited vastly from the online resources. Teachers diligently prepared and uploaded e-learning materials on the college website to ensure good accessibility for the students.

Response:

Lalgola College is a constituent college of the University of Kalyani and follows the syllabus prescribed by the university. However the College innovates constantly by adhering to a distinct mechanism for effective implementation.

The academic activities are-well-planned, ahead of each academic session and the entire process is streamlined with central and departmental academic calendars, time tables, work load and administrative task distributed among the faculties.

Before the commencement of every semester, respective departments prepare a study plan assignment for the individual teachers and number of classes allotted to each course. On the basis of this routine subcommittee prepares a detailed time table for entire semester. Finally this is distributed to the departmental teachers through the notice board.

Each Department meets the students in every semester in a session where they discuss academic calendar and teaching plan and receive feedbacks from the students.

The teachers of the College always respond to any call for workshops on changes and reforms in the syllabus as BOS members of the university, several teachers provide suggestions according to their areas to expertise and make use of students' feedback to suggest improvement in teaching methodology.

Experiential learning through projects, field work, study tours etc. facilitate as a part of curriculum implementation. The college and the departments organize seminars, workshops and special lectures to integrate several cross-cutting issues prescribed in the curriculum like gender ethics human values, environment and sustainability, externally relevant to students in today's world. Extension activities organized by the college N.S.S activities also address these cross-cutting issues.

Many of our teachers take great initiative towards making power point presentation in order to make their teaching more effective. Lalgola College has three smart class rooms with modern teaching aids and equipments, which are made use of greatly.

In addition to these all, Lalgola College conducts departmental seminars where the students and teachers take part. Students take part in seminars and present their papers on specific subjects. We also hire experts on different subjects and they address the students in various seminars in order to enrich the students and teachers alike.

The college organize internal assessment two times for each semester as scheduled by University of Kalyani. As the part of assessment different departments organize term paper presentation, open book test, oral test, peer tutoring, micro teaching, written test etc.

College provides special guidance to the slow learners and arrenge tutorial classes for them and it is mentioned in the routine.

Response:

Our Institution offers an **Outcome-Based Curriculum** in which various courses are offered to address the cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics.

Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC) on **Environmental Studies** is a mandatory course for all Under Graduate programmes. Awareness of the Environment, Environmental protection and a Safe Environment for future generations are one of the major concerns of the world.

This course aims to make the students understand the present **environment status** and to know their roles and responsibilities about environmental protection. It also focuses on the scientific dimensions of various **environmental issues** and also enhances knowledge on the values of natural resources, various aspects of environmental issues and their causes, effects and possible solutions to overcome environmental issues and to safeguard the environment.

The course deals elaborately with the study of the environmental system, the status of its inherent or induced changes on organisms and the **Sustainable environment.** It includes not only the study of physical and biological characters of the environment but also the social and cultural factors and the impact of man on the environment. To develop a world in which persons are aware of and concerned about the environment and the problems associated with it, and committed to working individually as well as collectively towards solutions of current problems and prevention of future problems.

The course deals with pertinent issues like **environmental pollution**, its prevention, deforestation, **global warming**, rainwater harvesting, and it creates awareness among the students about the necessity of protection of Environment and Nature.

Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum

The course on **General Awareness** is the mandatory course for all Under Graduate programmes. The objective of the course on General Awareness is to inculcate human, social and ethical values among the students. The course inculcates skills both on personal as well as academic levels.

Under Graduate students of Philosophy has the course regarding professional ethics that inculcate the students to know the ethics, associated with business policies and practices regarding potentially controversial subjects including corporate governance, insider trading bribery discrimination, corporate social responsibility, and fiduciary responsibility. A paper on human values and peace education is also included in the syllabus of department of education. The learning outcomes of this paper are to understand the concept and importance of human values and to know the role of teachers to inculcate values among students.

Gender sensitivity;

Gender related courses are an integral component of various programmes. Students are sensitized and encouraged to work towards gender equality from a cultural perspective.

Gender sensitization camps are organized in college campus time to time, that include women's right, human right, gender justice and gender equality. Community out rich programmes are organized that include health and hygiene camps village adaptation enable exposure to real life situations. DEI annually organizes seminars conferences that help in gender sensitization.

In a student -centered approach to learning, classrooms move from direct instruction to a more community-driven environment, one which supports student empowerment, conversations, critical thinking skills, independence and problem-solving techniques. Student centered learning strategies do require and involve students in the overall planning, process, implementation and assessments.

- Most of the faculty members generally adopt a student centric approach such as project based and problem-solving method as well as participative learning approaches .
- In such strategies emphasis is given on student collaboration, communication and creativity as well as teacher as facilitator.
- Departments such as education, Geography and environmental studies provide shorter projects with a problem for students. This strategy utilizes relevant, real-life connections to the outside world providing students valuable experience with problem solving and critical thinking opportunities.
- Most of our dept., adopt innovative teaching strategies, such as peer tutoring, micro-teaching, term Paper Presentation, meetings among teachers, students & parents.
- Such strategies enable the students to feel involved in the participatory process.
- Students are taken to natural history museums and other historical places.
- Mock parliaments are held.
- Students are encouraged to participate in inter-college sports.
- The learning experience is enriched by extensive use of ICT tools- PPTS

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Lalgola College is affiliated to the University of Kalyani and is guided by the regulations framed by the University regarding examination and evaluation. Lalgola College strives to ensure transparent and fair continuous internal assessment. The college arranged for class tests surprise test, open book test. Answer scripts were shown to students. Parent-teacher meetings were arranged to apprise them of their wards' performance. The University introduced CBCS in 2018-19. In this system, 15 marks are awarded through

internal evaluation, and the rest 60 is awarded by external examiners in the end-semester examination. For practical-based subjects, the distribution is 20% for internal 30% for practical, and 50% for external evaluation. Monthly attendance is calculated by the departments and intimated to the students. Mentors discuss the issue with students with low attendance, suggestions are provided. The college follows the pattern of internal and tutorial examination as prescribed by University of Kalyani . The internal assessment is arranged centrally, marks are submitted by departmental faculty ; tutorial examinations are taken following the guidelines of the university, presenting term papers, projects, written tests, group discussions, surprise test, open book test. presentations, Micro teaching , Debate Competition etc.

Lalogola College has developed a robust mechanism to ensure that the process of continuous assessment is transparent and efficient. The college has a separate Examination Committee for semesters, which is entrusted with not only conducting the internal and university examinations but also in accordance with the UGC Norms, Lalgola College has formed a Grievance redressal committees and ensuring the redressal of any exam-related grievances. During the pandemic, all examinations including end semester examinations were conducted by the institution with guidance from the affiliating university. All grievances related to examinations, uploading of answer scripts etc., were successfully met by the examination committee. Adequate concession is given in attendance of students on medical grounds and for participation in extracurricular activities. In case of university level end-semester examination, any grievance of students is communicated by the college to the University authority. If a student is dissatisfied with his/her marks, he/she can apply for review of his/her answer script as and when required by the University after paying the prescribed fee. The University provides the photocopy of answer sheets to students against Right to Information and takes adequate steps for redressal.

This grievance redressal committee also regularly invite meeting and give suggestions/ recommendations after analyzing different feedback, complaints or grievances made by students and teachers on different issues including teaching, learning and evaluation process. Resolutions are taken by the members and sent to the IQAC. IQAC again analyses the resolution taken by the grievance redrassal committee and recommends the necessary action to be taken immediately to solve the grievance. Finally Principal and G.B members take decision regarding necessary measures as well as action to be taken to solve the problems/ grievances faced by the students or teachers and make teaching learning process more effective.

The curriculum of all the programmes is framed by the University of Kalyani and Lalgola College adheres to the curricula. The Departmental Teachers along with the members of the IQAC formulate the learning outcomes keeping in mind the UGC guidelines and the directives of the National Education Policy. Teachers spell out the learning outcomes of the course at the beginning of each semester. Thus students are made aware of the expectations of the course at the very outset. The course outcomes are also given to the students at the time they are given the class schedules. Thus every student is aware of the same. The institution through its academic sub-committee and IQAC monitors the progress and performance of the students in the form of programme outcomes and course outcomes. The principal is well-informed of it and takes necessary measures through such sub-committee & IQAC in order to motivate the students to qualify NET/SET exams, for MA admission and for getting different course related jobs.

- A large no. of students (Specially in Education and Arabic) of different subjects get first class (or higher grade) in University final exams.
- A large no. of students of different subjects get admission in MA or B.ED courses every year.
- A few students can get admitted in different professional courses and training every year.
- Some students regularly get absorbed in different professions.
- A few students every year qualifify NET/SET (Specially in Education) and get admitted in Ph.D courses.
- Alumni association of social groups are formed comprising of former students. Students and teachers interact with each other through online and offline meetings and exchange valuable ideas.
- University results and performance of students in different courses (MA), NET/SET exam and jobs are reviewed and analysed in the meeting of academic ,IQAC committees and necessary remedial measures are taken for the interest of our student.

2.6.2: Direct ways to evaluate course outcome:

- In adherence to the regulations of the University of Kalyani apart from the semester- end examinations, Lalgola College conducts an internal examination consisting of attendance (5 marks) and internal assessment (10 marks).
- In addition, Lalgola College also conducts continuous internal evaluation through tests and project based assignments which helps to judge the course outcomes and provides the opportunities to students for improvement.
- After identifying the academically weaker students, departmental meetings are held to determine appropriate measures like arranging remedial classes for them.
- The students who receives the highest marks in the university examinations are awarded so that it boosts their morale and motivates others to perform well.

Indirect ways to evaluate course outcomes:-

- Here score for indirect course outcomes is calculated through the feedback reports obtained from the students after completion of the course.
- Feedback forms are circulated among the students the average score is obtained based on the student's responses.
- Attainment level score is calculated for each course by combining 80% of direct method score and 20% of the indirect method score.

Response: Lalgola College was established in 2005 to cater the needs of Higher education in this remote part of the country. It is the only General Degree College in entire Lalgola and Bhagabangola Block. Since its inception, the college is relentlessly trying to upgrade its infrastructural facilities. The college is affiliated with Kalyani University and many courses have been introduced with the combinations provided by the university from time to time

. To increase student strength, the college has always taken proactive steps to provide various facilities to develop the infrastructure of the campus in terms of classrooms, laboratories and for sports and extra cocurricular activities.

The main building of the college accommodates the class rooms, Library, Principal's room, teachers' room, office room, separate common rooms for boys and girls with adequate recreational facilities and a gymnasium. Besides the main building, there is a separate building for the students' union and college canteen.

There are eleven well ventilated, specious and fully furnished class rooms for conducting theory classes. Out of these eleven class rooms, one room has a smart board and two class rooms have LCD projectors and internet facilities. Other than these, there are laboratories for Geography Department and Physical Education Department. The laboratories are upgraded with advanced equipment and have enough space to carry out practical classes effectively.

There is a computer lab in the college as well. There are twenty three computers in the college. Seven computers are used to carry out office related works. All the computers are connected with internet facilities. Free Wi-Fi connection is available in the campus. Students are encouraged to avail Wi-Fi facilities for academic purposes.

There is a seminar hall with a capacity of accommodating two hundred people and the hall is well equipped with good audio-visual facilities. The college Library has more than ten thousands books and ten journals for students and staff as well.

Students' common rooms have indoor game facilities like Carom, chess etc. There are sanitary napkin vending machines and disposal machine in the girls' common room. Students representative take active initiative in the maintenance of common rooms.

Students and staff are also encouraged to use college gymnasium for maintaining good physical health. There is a separate room for College NSS unit. A Girls 'hostel has been established for residential facilities of the female students but at present no student resides there. The college also boasts of a large cycle garage to promote green and sustainable transportation practices.

There is an open-air stage for cultural programs and proper arrangement of purified drinking water is available in the college campus. The beautiful sprawling lawn of the college has resting benches for students.

He is the ex-officio of the teacher's council and he is assisted by the non-teaching staff.

The Teachers' Council has to undertake a crucial role in maintaining, planning and implementing the entire teaching –learning system, academic administration and all the curricular and co-curricular activities.

The Departmental Heads play major roles is running the respective departments, working in coordination with the Principal's instructions.

Response:

1.Women Empowerment, Awareness on Women Trafficking and Queer Identity: Women's Cell of Lalgola College organised seminars on gender sensitization on 8.3.19, 19.2.20, 17.5.22 and 22.3.23. Themes of the seminars were centered on the issues of child marriage and women trafficking, Queer identities and women empowerment. The first was held in the collaboration with the Child in Need Institute. The Officer in Charge of Lalgola College, Soumya De, had presided over the seminar. The second was centered on the idea- 'Social structures and Queer Identities', where teachers from various departments delivered their lectures on the idea of inclusivity in gender construct. At the third seminar social activist Khadija Banu from the NGO 'Royeka Nari Unnayan Samity' (Registration Number: SL/54627- 2008-2009) delivered her key note lecture on women empowerment before the audience and enlightened the students about different perspectives of social problems and marginalization of women. The other seminar, conducted by the Child In Need Institute, provided the students with several safety related information (like activities of child welfare committee, uses of phone no 1098, etc.) those of which would be applied when situation demanded. Resource persons from CINI screened a documentary to help female students understand the pros and cons of cyber crime and facilitated them in adopting means to combat trafficking and exploitation. The Women's Cell of the college had also arranged for the screening of Meghe Dhaka Tara, by Ritwick Ghatak to bring the issue of gender equity to the forefront on 18.2.20.

2. The administration has encouraged women employees to become HODs, Coordinators of Faculties, members of administrative and statutory bodies to lead the college from the front. Significant representation of women members in various bodies bear testimony to it. Various leave benefits like Maternity Leave and the Child Care Leave are also granted. Students' bodies also maintain gender equity in its representation. The College played a pioneering role by installing three **sanitary napkin vending machine in the girls' common room**. International Women's Day is celebrated every year with talks, seminars, interactive session and debates with enthusiastic participation of the students, staff and faculty members of the College. Apart from the Women's Cell, the college has an Anti-ragging Committee, Students' Grievance Redressal Cell, Psychological Counselling Cell and the Anti Sexual Harassment Cell. Feedback is collected and analysed by the members of these cells to solve problems.

3. Lalgola College follows the section of the university **curriculum which highlights issues related to gender**. Befitting the purpose of the courses the selection of the texts is not essentially or unjustly Eurocentric, thereby enhancing the scope of identification for all. In an age when women are walking

every sphere of socio-cultural discourse hand-in-hand with their male counterparts the significance of these courses only gain more relevance. Emancipation of women in every strata of life can be actualized only with true knowledge of empowerment. The courses includes uncomfortable texts and discussions that are vital for the sanity and growth of society and, thereby, of nation as well.

7.2.1

Response:

1. **Women Squad:** Regular awareness programmes on Child Trafficking, Child Marriage and other socially relevant issues are discussed among local female population and they are educated about the dangers of women's trafficking.

Women's Self Employment and Empowerment: Students of Lalgola College, under the supervision of some teachers, regularly visit the neighbouring community and spread awareness among them on the possibilities of healthier employment opportunities. They are taught about the most updated processes of preserving and marketing their domestic food products like mango pickles and mango jam/jelly/juice.

The Practice:

The Women Squad of Lalgola College has succeeded in arranging interactive sessions with the Child in Need Institute for local women to make them aware of women and children trafficking. The Squad has

provided local women with masks and sanitisers so that they can keep themselves protected from contagious diseases. Students of the college regularly visit the surrounding locality to create awareness on menstrual health and hygiene.

Problems faced and Resources required:

- The Women Squad has often to face cultural barriers when working on local women's empowerment initiatives as some communities resist changes that challenge traditional gender roles.
- Local women at Lalgola mostly engage in informal labour related to the tobacco industry and often refuse to accept alternative employment opportunities.
- Addressing these challenges require a multifaceted approach that involves building partnerships and networks.
- Implementation of proper health care facilities for women is one of the most important resources that is required by the Women Squad to conduct fieldworks.

Future Plans:

- The Women Squad of Lalgola College plans to arrange workshops like yoga and stress management which will help in creating a relaxing session to unwind and distress.
- The Squad plans to conduct self-defense programmes for women at and beyond the campus.

2. Centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola

Objective: To preserve the history of Lalgola and transmit it within new generation.

The Context

Lalgola, situated on the banks of the Padma river in West Bengal, stands as a region of historical, cultural and social significance. It had been home to rulers, zamindars and settlers who migrated from various regions of India, especially Western India, during the 18th and 19th centuries because of social unrests, famines and natural calamities.

Lalgola had close connection with Natore (now in Bangladesh) and with Benaras during the Sanyasi Rebellion (1772-73). A secret tunnel from the Lalgola Raj-bari, opened onto the bank of Kalkali River, had been a place where Sanyasis congregated and Lalgola's chief temple priest Kali Brahma Bhattacharya trained them how to battle against the British forces.

These sanyasis spoke Bhojpuri, since these families had migrated from the Bhojpuri regions of Uttar Pradesh and Bihar. The Bhojpuri speaking monks acted as retinue for the Lalgola zamindars.

In recent years, Lalgola, an important site of historical and cultural significance is slipping into oblivion. In the run of time and furies of nature, Lalgola has been left to languish in the backyard of history.

Practice

The Centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola endeavours to, redeem the History of Lalgola, and Maharaja Yogendra Narain Rai, the dared to combat the mighty British government. It tries to bring to

the forefront the heritage sites of the place, bordering Bangladesh, with special focus on the Rajbari and the Kali temple. The latter enshrines the idol of Keli who is bound in chains in a grim ambience, representing difficult times of the British Rule. The Goddess is said to have been a reflector of the aspirations of the awakened. Nation, India, with symbolising the figure of the protecting mother, glowing in bliss.

With the intention of making its students aware of Lalgola's history, the centre for Studies in the History of Lalgola offers a storehouse of books that deal with documentations on regional history of the area. The library of this centre has got around 100 books in its collection along with a photo gallery displaying heritages of Lalgola.

Besides enabling students to access books, the Centre also arranges for seminars and conferences at the college premise. Its has collaborated with Murshidabad Itihas Charcha Kendro so as to broaden the aspects of learning and research. Resource persons from varied areas have been invited to deliver lectures on Lalgola's history. The Centre aims at archiving several manuscripts on regional history. For this purpose it collaborates with Lalgola Public Library and keeps itself updated with information on latest addition of historical documents.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

- Increased financial assistance is required for maintenance of the Centre.
